I am writing to provide comments on behalf of the City of Fruitland for the upcoming hearing on June 13, 2024. The City of Fruitland is opposed to the department of lands establishing the above referenced spacing unit primarily because of its inclusion of the city's one and only wastewater treatment facility and surrounding infrastructure. The city invested approximately 18 million dollars in this critical infrastructure and there is concern that location of a gas/oil well nearby could potentially interfere with that infrastructure. The City's wastewater facility consists of a headworks building, two 1 million gallon concrete oxidation ditches, two large concrete clarifiers, a multitude of underground piping and other associated infrastructure. If directional drilling takes place under these critical pieces of equipment, there is always a possibility that damage could result.

The city feels that current regulations do not provide anywhere near appropriate liability insurance amounts to cover such potential damage, in addition to the fact that if the wastewater facility were to be damaged, we have no redundant facilities to treat the entire city's residential, commercial and industrial wastewater.

The City of Fruitland feels strongly that the Department of Lands should take this into consideration when making decisions about oil and gas drilling taking place near municipal infrastructure. If this spacing unit is established, the city would be very

concerned about the proximity of the well pad location in relation to our wastewater facility. The City of Fruitland is also adamantly opposed to any surface use of city property should the spacing unit be established, and is prepared to seek legal remedies should this become an issue.

We respectfully ask the Department of Lands to take our concerns into consideration and do what is necessary to protect the citizens of Fruitland and the city's critical infrastructure.
